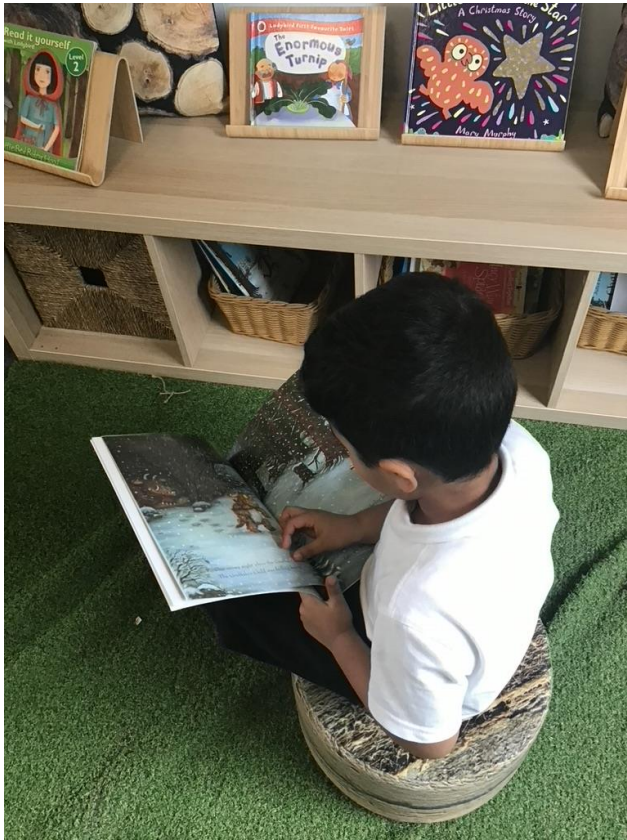


# Reading in Reception at Glodwick Infant and Nursery School



Reading is very important. It will help your child in everything they do!



There is much more to reading than reading the words. We read to:

- Learn
- Understand
- Enjoy!!!

**Children see words everyday.**

**Help them to learn to read them by:**

- Pointing out words at home and when you are out shopping.
- Read with them.
- Surround them with books - join the library.
- **READ STORIES DAILY!!!**



# Beginning to Read

- Children begin to learn to read by understanding how books work. They need to be able to:
  - Start at the front
  - Turn the pages over
  - Understand which are the pictures.
  - Tell a story using the pictures.
- 
- Children will quickly find a favourite book and will want to read it again and again. This will help children understand about stories and help them to learn some story language.

# Any book is a reading book

We like the children to have a wide variety of reading material.

- Reading scheme books



- Library books
- Comics
- A mix of fiction and non-fiction.

Reading at home.

- Point out shop signs



- Read logos - shopping bags, cereal packets, food tins etc



- Instead of rewarding with sweets or toys treat them to a new book.

# Reading with your child



- Choose a book your child likes or let your child choose.
- Sit with them in a quiet place.
- Talk about the pictures. This can be done in any language.
- Ask them to turn the pages.
- Ask questions.

## Questions

- Who is it?
- Where is he? How do you know?
- What does he look like?
- Do you think they are friends?

# Reading in school

- Your child will read each week in a group. We call this guided reading.
- They will read individually to a teacher once a week.
- They have daily phonics lessons.
- They will bring home key words which we want them to learn to read on sight.



# Reading at Home

- Your child will bring a new reading book home everyday.
- Try to spend 10-15 minutes a day listening to your child read.
- Please ask them questions about what they have read.
- Remember some children will still be at the stage where they are telling the story through the pictures rather than reading the words.
- They will bring home key words which we want them to learn to read on sight. These are words which they will see lots of times in their reading books.

# Teaching Phonics

Phonics is learning the letter sounds that children need to be able to read.

We use Jolly Phonics in reception to help the children learn the sounds.

Jolly phonics has actions and songs to help children remember their sounds.
